Olympics 2024



The 2024 summer Olympic Games took place in Paris, France, from 26 July to 11 August. This year also marked the 100th anniversary of Ireland first taking part in the Olympic Games as an independent country, in 1924.



Since first entering the games a hundred years ago, Ireland had its most successful games ever, winning seven medals in total, four gold and three bronze.

Daniel Wiffen, from Armagh, won a gold and a bronze medal in swimming. Mona McSharry, from Sligo, also won a bronze in swimming.

The Skibbereen duo of Paul O'Donovan and Fintan McCarthy took gold in men's rowing for the second time while Daire Lynch and Philip Doyle, from Tipperary, also won bronze in rowing.

Dublin boxer Kellie Harrington won a second gold Olympic medal this year, having won her first in the last Olympics in Tokyo in 2021. This makes her the first Irish boxer to win two gold medals and, also, the only female boxer in the world to become a two-time, Olympic, gold medal winner.

The Olympic Games is the world's largest sporting event. It is held every four years, except during the Covid pandemic when it was postponed for a year. More than 200 nations are represented in 330 different sports.

Taking part in the Olympics is a huge achievement as only the top athletes in their chosen sport can qualify. Team Ireland was made up of 143 athletes and, although not everyone was lucky enough to win a medal, our athletes put in a fantastic performance. Some just narrowly missed out in winning a medal. Rhasidat Adeleke, from Dublin, came 4th in the women's 400 metre final while the women's relay team also came 4th in their final. This was the first time that an Irish relay team qualified for an Olympic final.

The Paralympic Games took place from 30 August to 8 September.

The first paralympic games were held in Rome in 1960. These games are an opportunity for athletes who have a disability to take part at world level. They are held every four years and since 2008, are always held in the same city as the Olympic Games. Like the Olympics, only the very best athletes in their chosen sport qualify to take part.

Ireland was proudly represented in the Paralympic Games by a strong team of 35 athletes who took part in nine different sports.



The team took home six medals, one gold, three silver and two bronze. Róisín Ní Ríain won two bronze medals in swimming and narrowly missed out on winning a third medal when she came 4th.

Katie-George Dunlevy won an outstanding gold and two silver in cycling.

All three athletes have visual impairment. Katie-George Dunlevy races with a co-cyclist known as a pilot. The pilot, who sits on the front of the tandem bike (a bicycle for two people), directs her on the cycle track.

Both teams arrived home to a huge welcome in Dublin where friends, families and spectators turned out to greet them.


