Thoughts for the New Year



As we begin a new year, it is often nice to make plans or changes for the months ahead. Sometimes it can be helpful to look at some of the wise words of others to help inspire and encourage us.

Martin Luther King Junior (1929-1968) was leader of the American Civil Rights movement in the 1960s, that stood up for the rights of black Americans.

He was against violence and instead organised large protest walks where thousands of people took part and listened to King giving rousing speeches. A line from one of his speeches from 1964 can be seen here:

"If I cannot do great things, then I can do small things in a great way."

We do not all have the power to make big changes or decisions, but we can all make sure that even the smallest task we do, we can give it our best shot. I might not be the leader of the country, but I can volunteer in my local community or in a local charity. It is the thousands of people doing small things well that make a country great.

"Yesterday is history. Tomorrow is a mystery. Today is a gift. That's why it's called the present."

We cannot change what has already happened in the past. We do not know what tomorrow will bring but we can enjoy today.

The founder of the technology company Apple, Steve Jobs (1955-2011), was given the news in 2005 that he had cancer which could not be cured. In a speech, shortly before he died, he said that when faced with death he realised that life is the most precious gift ever given to us.

We must never waste it. He said we should live everyday as if it was our last and never be afraid to live our dreams. We must have courage to follow what is in our heart even when others tell us we can't.

Mark Twain (1835-1910) was a famous American writer of many novels. He was famous for his many sayings, one such saying was:


"Twenty years from now, you will be more disappointed by the things that you didn't do, than by the ones you did do."

Nelson Mandela (1918-2013) was leader of the ANC (African National Congress), an organisation that worked for equal rights for all people in South Africa. He was sent to prison where he remained for 27 years. When he was released, instead of being angry, he called for peace. He became a well-respected speaker on behalf of peace, not only in South Africa, but all over the world. In 1994, at the age of 77, he became the first black president of South Africa. He is still famous for his many inspiring words.

Muhammad Ali (1942-2016), regarded as the greatest heavy-weight boxer of all time, was asked one time about how he managed to become so successful. He said:

Capital Letters and full stops.





When to use capital letters:

- 1. At the **beginning of every sentence**. Example: The sun was shining.
- When writing about yourself, using "I".

Example: John and I went to school together.

3. First letter of days of week, months and public holidays.

Examples: Monday, September, Christmas, St. Patrick's Day.

- 4. At the start of names and surnames. Examples: Mary Black, Sam O'Brien.
- 5. For names of places, towns, streets, countries, rivers, mountains, buildings.
 Examples: Parnell Street, Bray, Co. Wicklow, River Shannon, The Grand Hotel,
 Croke Park
- 6. For letters used instead of a word in the title.

Examples: RTÉ NALA PRSI GAA

- 7. **For the title of a person.** Examples: Mr. Mrs. Dr. Miss
- 8. For titles of books, films and newspapers.

Examples: "Harry Potter", "Star Wars", "The Sunday Independent".

- 9. **For brand names.** Examples: Barry's Tea, Tayto, Kit Kat, Jacobs Fig Rolls.
- 10. **For names of businesses, shops.** Examples: Penney's, Aldi, Dunne's Stores

When to use a full stop:

- 1. **At the end of every sentence.** Example: The car is parked outside.
- 2. To show that a word has been shortened.

(We place the full stop at the end of the word.)

Examples: Instead of writing county, we shorten it to "Co."

Instead of using street, we use "St."

Instead of using Mister we use "Mr."

Instead of using Tuesday we use "Tues."




